Re: In support of Representative Donovan's H7336, The Office of Early Childhood Development and Learning

Dear Chair Abney and members of the Finance Committee,

We write in support of Representative Donovan's bill to create a new Office of Early Childhood Development and Learning.

As you know, the General Assembly requested, and the Administration lead a process last year resulting in the "Early Childhood Governance Systems Analysis" report released in December 2023. After participating in this process and reviewing the final report, Children's Friend believes that a new cabinet-level state agency of Early Childhood Services is needed to properly invest, coordinate, manage, and be accountable for services which result in better long-term outcomes for our kids, families, and our State. This bill would create such an agency and we urge the General Assembly to consider doing so.

We will note that while the Working Group on Early Childhood Governance did not recommend the creation of the new cabinet-level agency, there are many positive recommendations contained in their report on next steps. These recommendations can help move our early childhood system forward even in the absence of a new agency.

The recommended improvements in areas including data coordination and data driven decision making, role clarity in State agencies, coordinated budgeting and financial analysis, and a "no wrong door" approach to services, can all help to move the system forward now.

To achieve the possible positive impacts, these recommendations must be embraced by our Legislative and Executive leaders. If the General Assembly does not pass Rep Donovan's bill, we hope the General Assembly will continue to monitor the work of the agencies involved and encourage collaboration between the agencies and an open transparent process as the work moves forward.

Another bill by Representative Caldwell, H7934, would require ongoing attention to the report recommendations and we hope you will consider passing that resolution, if not this one.
